NEW PROCEDURE FOR CAMP INSURANCE

As a member benefit of your state coaches association, all members in good standing have a \$1,000,000 per occurrence General Liability policy limit that provides coverage for their coaching activities. In order to protect the General Liability policy from potential claims, the insurance company has mandated that all coaches must obtain signed waivers and provide Participant/Accident insurance for their participants.

In order to obtain a certificate of insurance showing proof of insurance or naming an additional insured, the following must be in place:

- Waivers: Signed waivers showing indemnification language
- Participant/Accident Insurance: You must have Participant/Accident coverage in place for all participants attending sports camps.

General Considerations for Basketball Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association (PIAA) National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) Sports Medicine Advisory Committee (SMAC)

The NFHS has determined that basketball is a moderate risk sport (sports that involve close, sustained contact, but with protective equipment in place that may reduce the likelihood of respiratory particle transmission between participants OR intermittent close contact OR group sports OR sports that use equipment that can't be cleaned between participants).

BASKETBALL RULE CONSIDERATIONS:

• Pregame Protocol (2019-2021 NFHS Officials Manual, page 16, 1.8)

- Limit attendees to the referee, head coach, and one captain from each team with each coach standing on the center circle on each side of the division line.
- All individuals maintain a social distance of 6 feet or greater at the center circle.
- Suspend handshakes prior to and following the Pregame Conference.

• Team Benches (1-13-1)

Social distancing should be practiced when possible. Below are some suggestions.

Limit the number of bench personnel to observe social distancing of 6 feet or greater.

Place team benches opposite the spectator seating.

Additional chairs or rows may be added to allow bench personnel to observe social distancing of 6 feet or greater.

Create separation between the team bench and spectator seating behind the bench.

Limit contact between players when substituting.

• Substitutes shall report to the scorer's table but in the event there is more than one substitution, they may sit at the end of the scores table closest to their bench to maintain social distancing.

Coaches and Athletes should adhere to the current Pennsylvania Secretary of the Department of Health **Order** of July 1, 2020.

Ball shall be sanitized as recommended by the ball manufacturer and not used for warm-ups. The host school should ensure that the ball is sanitized during time-outs and between quarters. Sanitizer should be provided by the host team at the table.

PA Coach-



Penn State Behrend head men's basketball coach Dave Niland enters his 27th season guiding the Behrend Lions program. Niland has produced 26 consecutive winning seasons to rank 20th among NCAA Division III programs for winningest teams of the decade. The Lions also have earned an NCAA or ECAC postseason bid in 24 of the past 25 years. Niland is the all-time leader in men's basketball coaching victories with 515 entering this season. The Lions have advanced to the NCAA Tournament eight times and has made 14 appearances in the ECAC South Region Tournament, winning the title in 1998-99 and 2009-10.

Niland has been named the AMCC Coach of the Year seven times— a league and college record. His teams have won seven regular-season league titles and six conference tournament championships. In 2008-09, the men's basketball team forged a record of 18-10 and earned its third ECAC Tournament bid. The previous year, Niland led the Behrend Lions to an impressive 24-5 record, as the team captured the regular-season AMCC championship and the conference tournament before eventually falling in the second round of the NCAA Tournament in Rochester, New York. That squad's defensive prowess was recognized for the second time in four seasons, as Behrend led Division III in scoring defense, limiting the opposition to a measly 54.6 points per game.

PA Coach-



During the 2006-07 season, Niland's team posted an impressive 21-8 mark and advanced to the ECAC Southern Region Tournament Championship Game. The year before, coach Niland's program received the Schoenfeld Award, the highest honor the Collegiate Basketball Officials Association (COBA) bestows each year. This coveted award is presented to the team identified as having "the highest degree of sportsmanship, character, and ethics among their players, coaches and spectators."

His 2003-04 team led all of Division III in scoring defense and posted a 22-3 record entering the NCAA Tournament. The 1999-2000 team had the best season in school history, setting the school record for wins with 26 while advancing to the NCAA Elite Eight—the first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance for men's basketball. Also, in 1998-99, his squad earned the ECAC Southern Region Championship.

Niland came to Behrend after spending four seasons as an assistant coach at Canisius College and one season at Elmira College. He was a four-year letterman and captain during his senior year as a basketball standout at LeMoyne College. He earned his master's degree in physical education from Canisius and is now also a lecturer in health and physical education at Penn State Behrend.

Dealing With Parents

We started having mandatory parents/players meetings in the 1990's after I heard Marquette's Coach AI McGuire speak at a clinic. He asked how many of us had problems with parents, and almost everyone raised their hand. He asked how many of us had a meeting with the parents before the season explaining YOUR expectations for THEIR behavior. No one raised their hand. Coach McGuire said, "I do not feel sorry for any of you." We have had a meeting every year since that clinic.

I sent a letter to every parent, our administration, and our school board inviting them to the meeting. I invited the administration and the school board so they could be a part of the process, because many parents will go over your head to them and I would rather they heard first from me. Remember, be proactive, not reactive. I would also ask the parents to contact me directly if they would not attend the meeting. If they did not, but approached me during the season I would tell them that we discussed that at the meeting and that they did not contact me so I would not discuss it now.

At the meeting we discussed team rules that the players and parents had to sign and return to me. We discussed that playing time was earned and not negotiated. We discussed the difference between role and status. Not everyone has the same role, but they all have the same status. We reminded them that the players had at least 160 free opportunities to improve during our offseason and preseason programs. We discussed multiple sport athletes. We discussed that if a parent ever requested a meeting that the meeting would include our entire coaching staff and their son. We discussed the "outside noise." We discussed how I deal with the media. I told the parents that our practices were open, we had nothing to hide, but if they attended DO NOT coach. In 31 years, not one ever attended. Finally, we discussed my relationship with and the role of the booster group.

As I stated in the title, I truly believe the key is to be proactive and not reactive. I was a head coach at two different high schools in the suburbs of Pittsburgh and I could count on one hand the number of major issues I ever had with a parent.

ADMINISTRATIVE AND DISCUSSION ITEMS

- Electronic whistles are permissible (supplies are limited).

- Official can designate another official to toss the ball in the center restraining circle for all jump-ball situations. (Rule 2-5-1)

• Scorebook

 Officials do not need to sign the score book but will need to have verbal verification on roster and starter submissions prior to the 10 minute mark.

3. There was discussion on potential changes for post-season. Mrs. Grassel explained the reasoning for the limitation on qualifiers for fall championships and how it reduces cross state travel as well as limiting possible exposures. Dr. lacino commented that it was too early to make any finite decisions on basketball post-season. Mrs. Grassel offered the suggestion of reconvening the committee sometime during the season to review possible post season scenarios if warranted.

ADJOURNMENT

Mrs. Grassel adjourned the meeting of the PIAA Basketball Steering Committee at 1:53 p.m., Tuesday, October 13th, 2020.

HICKORY HIGH SCHOOL

Coach Mele just completed his 3rd year as the Hickory High School Boys Basketball Coach. Hickory competes in District 10 in the AAAA Division. The Hornets won the District 10 Title this year for the second year in a row and the first back to back titles at Hickory since the 1950's.

The Hornets reached the PIAA Quarterfinals but did not get a chance to play the game because of the statewide shutdown due to the coronavirus. Hickory finished the season with a record of 23-4 and the Hornets have compiled a 3- year record of 71-12 under the direction of Coach Mele.

Mele credits his assistant coaches, Jeanette Whitehead, Marco Miller, Gary Swanson and Jon Walsh for helping create a winning culture at Hickory.

Before arriving at Hickory, Mele was the Varsity Girls Basketball Coach at Kennedy Catholic High School and led the Golden Eagles to 4 consecutive District 10 Championships and an overall record of 92-12.

Chris and his wife Michelle live in Hermitage and have 4 children, 2 of which (Tyler and Peyton Mele) play on Hickory's basketball team.

HICKORY HIGH SCHOOL

Donald has been a 4-year starter at point guard for the Hickory Hornets and has led his team to back to back District 10 Titles, 2 PIAA Quarterfinals and 1 PIAA Semifinal and was selected on the PIAA All State Team his junior year.

He has scored 1,837 points in his career and is the second leading scorer in Hickory High School history and will go down as one of the very best players in Mercer County history.

This season he averaged 21 points, 5 assists, 3 steals and 3 rebounds per game and shot 75% from the foul line.

A lightning quick guard with great ball handling skills, he also shoots the ball very well off the dribble as well as the outside while also having the ability to elevate and finish at the rim. Donald has also consistently been one of the best defenders on his teams at Hickory.

North Allegheny junior guard Lizzy Groetsch has truly displayed the heart of a champion. The first player in the gym at 5:30 a.m. and typically the last to leave after practice, Groetsch's desire and determination led North Allegheny to a WPIAL Class 6A championship in 2020. The Tigers defeated Bethel Park 54-50 in overtime in the title tilt. Groetsch tallied a team-high 19 points against a Black Hawks defense designed to stop her and netted the goahead basket with 25 seconds to play in the extra session to give NA a 51-50 lead.

An impact player since her freshman season, Groetsch has helped North Allegheny to three WPIAL Class 6A title game appearances and two District 7 crowns. The University of Pennsylvania commit has racked up 1,051 points in her three-year career and tallied her 1,000th-career point during NA's championship victory against Bethel Park.

For the 2019-2020 campaign, Groetsch led the Tigers with 17.4 points per game, also averaging 7.7 rebounds, 4.1 assists, 3.7 steals and 1.2 blocks per contest. With the ability to slash to the rim and knock down the 3-pointer, the talented guard also poured in 41-percent of her shots from beyond the arc and had a 78-percent success rate at the free-throw line. For her efforts this season, Groetsch was named First-Team All-Section by the Big 56 Conference for the second straight season and the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette girls' basketball Player of the Year. Additionally, Groetsch was selected to the PG's Fab Five team and the Trib Live High School Sports Network's Trib 10 all-star team.

With the help of Groetsch, North Allegheny reached the PIAA Class 6A quarterfinals before the season was halted due to COVID-19

Coach Kathy McCartney finished her 35th season at Villa Maria and had amassed 641 wins at the helm of the program.
