#### **STEPPING STONE - SWAKOPMUND**

Stepping Stone Trust operates a kindergarten and primary school called Stepping Stone Special Education School. Our pupils have a variety of disabilities including Down Syndrome, but we particularly specialise in the teaching of children on the Autism spectrum. Stepping Stone Special Education School is the only private school in Namibia that provides specialised, tailor-made education to children with Autism.

Stepping Stone: In Namibia, approximately 1 in every 68 children have some form of Autism ('are on the Autism Spectrum'). The majority of these children have not yet received a diagnosis due to limited medical access as well as a lack of awareness and knowledge of the disorder especially in rural areas. These children are usually relegated by the population and even their families. They are not placed in schools or if they do join a kindergarten, only attend until they grow too big or precarious. Where children have received a diagnosis of Autism, not enough schools or classes are available to help these pupils according to their specific needs.

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The school provides one educator for every two children. This allows children the opportunity to develop their full potential.

They now have twenty children and hope to extend their curriculum and classes in the future, but also make a point to keep the children's needs in mind and keep the number per class to a minimum.

Children with autism have different needs and while some can function with others around, others need a very quiet environment to be able to enjoy the teaching session.

Ms Mostert puts all her efforts towards achieving the best teaching method for these wonderful children.

The school is always looking for support, as some children cannot afford the school fees. Should you wish to get involved, please feel free to contact Ms Mostert for further information.

The **Gondwana Care Trust** assisted in donating a 'toddler security gate' that was needed at the school. Regular sponsors (Hurter & Visser Families), also assisted with the donation of toys donation by regular sponsors.

### LITTLE BUGS - SOSSUSVLEI

Little Bugs was founded out of a dire need in this area, where young children had to be sent away from their family to go to school or they would miss out on the basic educational steps that are so necessary to prepare children for their schooling.

Andrea, from Namib Balloon Safaris, founded Little bug so that women in the area could send their children to school, while accessing an opportunity to learn new skills and create goods from recycled items. They can then make a living by selling their creations to the tourism sector. Namib Desert Lodge on a regular basis purchases some of their creations to sell in their Curio Shop.

Little Bugs requested support from the Care Trust, to assist the school with stationary and hygienic products. The sponsorship value was N\$ 1113.58.

Over the last weekend in July, the children enjoyed great fun thanks to the School of Dance & Fitness. Instructors made their way to the school and spent time with the children. They also taught the group some Zumba and the importance of staying fit and having fun.

## KALUNDU PRE-SCHOOL - KATIMA MULILO

The Trust would also like to thank Mr and Mrs Louw for their financial support, and Yeti Panel for their assistance.

Children in this area have few options regarding schooling. We can never emphasize the importance of socializing and basic knowledge of language for children before they start their primary schooling. Far too many children start their school career with no prior basic preparation and quickly fall behind.

Kalundu Pre-school has two teachers who offer English as a home language and follow the Ministry's curriculum. This allows the children to be prepared for the first grade. Unfortunately, their school building was falling apart, which meant that classes could not sit together.

The pre-fabricated structure - previously used in Rundu for the Paukeni Kindergarten - works very well, is easy to assemble and is waterproof. The Kalundu school, still needs assistance with the acquisition of small chairs and tables for the children, as well as other educational materials.

Please see pictures of before and after. This pre-fabricated classroom is the second that Gondwana Care Trust has completed so far, and we are already looking at another community where the children are without a safe school structure. More information on this next challenging project to come soon. Cost for the project amounts to over N\$ 80 000 excluding some of the labour and transport cost from Walvis Bay to Katima, Kalundu village, that was provided free of charge.

#### MAMMADU TRUST - MARKET DAY

Since 2017 Mammadu has not only offered a pre-school class but also a Kindergarden for four-year olds. They now have 5 employees: Meme Dina the cook, Meme Arisa in charge of hygiene and cleanliness, Ms Yolande, the teacher for the little ones in the mornings, Mr Lino the teacher for the supervision of the school children in the afternoons and the bus driver with a Class C driver's licence who drives the school bus every day.

Mammadu looks after 63 children in total. All the children start the day with breakfast and leave after lunch. The older children can also have lunch before they finish their homework. Mammadu is really a blessing for these children as they have a safe place to study and a teacher to assist them.

MealForTwo, provides the centre with meat and occasionally with fresh vegetables.

In April, the centre was vandalized, and many items were stolen. The children were devastated. Some of the doors needed repairs and a lot of educational materials needed to be replaced.

Mammadu entered the Market Day in Windhoek to raise funds and Gondwana Care Trust assisted Mammadu with all the groceries. The day was very successful and Mammadu managed to raise over N\$ 8000.00!

Since 2003, NaDeet has been running environmental education programmes for school children and communities at NaDeeT Centre.

Since 2011, the schools have been receiving transport support from the Hardap Regional Ministry of Education office. This has been a tremendous help as it allows many schools that could otherwise not afford it to come to the centre.

Since last year, there has been drastic budget cut and funding for the transport has been left to sponsorship. Many children do not have the opportunity to learn about sustainability

and how to recycle. NaDeet Centre provides a safe and fun environment for children to learn and understand the importance of being eco-friendly and most of all on how to be user friendly in today's world.

Gondwana Care Trust was able to assist the centre and sponsor the transport for two schools with a total donation of N\$16000.00 this year.
